The back of the dollar bill is dominated by The Great Seal and the National Motto of the United States.

## The Great Seal of the United States

The Great Seal of the United States is used mainly for diplomatic purposes. It is affixed to treaties, commissions of diplomatic personnel, and letters from the president to foreign leaders. The Continental Congress adopted the design on June 20, 1782 and by the U.S. Congress on September 15, 1789.

William Barton, a Philadelphia lawyer and numismatist designed the front of the seal; Charles Thomson, secretary of the Continental Congress, designed the reverse.
The front of the seal features the motto "E Pluribus Unum" which means

adopted by Congress in 1956. If first appeared on coins, however, in 1864. It originated with verse four of "The Star-Spangled Banner" which ends. "And conguer we must when

our cause is just, and this be our motto, In God is our Trust."
